

Average Cost per Beneficiary 2015


Of the **\$2,870,000** spent in 2015, **\$2,420,000** was invested in the 29 programs from 21 countries featured in this report. This investment reached more than **103,650** beneficiaries.



Beneficiaries by Sector 2015





Agriculture and Food Security

In 2015, we invested over **\$800,000** in Agriculture and Food Security projects within our target communities, representing 34% of total funding.



Smallholder farming and garden projects in Cameroon, Ghana, Haiti, Guatemala, Ecuador, Mexico, India, and Nepal received more than \$323,000 in 2015. Their projects ranged from home and school gardens, to coffee production, bio-intensive agriculture, and millet production. The other 15% of the investment is comprised of livestock programs, adult education, and agricultural cooperatives.



In 2015, **11,244** people benefitted from Vibrant Village Foundation's investment in Agriculture and Food Security projects, with an average investment of \$74 per person. These projects ranged in cost from around \$1,500 in Ghana up to \$156,000 in Kenya, which reflects the different type, scope and scale of projects we fund. Gardens, small farms and co-ops tend to require a significant, upfront investment because of the initial cost of materials and construction, but require much less funding after they are established. Livestock and animal husbandry projects also require a larger initial investment and, barring any disease outbreaks, the cost of maintaining these projects is relatively low.

Beneficiaries with smallholder farms and gardens received 45% of the Agriculture and Food Security investment. Another 23% of Agriculture and Food Security projects were focused on Garden Cooperatives, and 19% on Farm Credit projects.

K-12 Education





K-12 Education projects in Ghana, Kenya, Malawi, Senegal, Haiti, and Guatemala received investments of approximately **\$500,000** in 2015. Investment in K-12 **Education projects** makes up 24% of the total portfolio.

Over 95% of funds went towards projects improving school infrastructure like classrooms and materials in Ghana, Malawi, Senegal, and Haiti as well as school operations costs for the John Branchizio School in Haiti.







2015 Total Investment by Sector: K12 Education



At least 6,190 students benefitted from our investments in K-12 Education. In Haiti, we provide all funding support for the John Branchizio school with over 600 students with a 98% pass rate on their state exams.

Vibrant Village Foundation invested an average of \$353 per student in our K-12 Education projects in 2015.



Average Cost per Beneficiary 2015


Clean Water 2015: Project Cost


Clean Water

In 2015, we invested more than \$437,000 in Clean Water projects in Cameroon, Ghana, Kenya, Malawi, Zimbabwe, Haiti, Sri Lanka, Cambodia, and Vietnam. These projects make up 18% of our 2015 portfolio.






Project costs vary due to many factors including water table depth, size of the target community (outreach efforts), and the type of water sources constructed/repaired. Wells and hand pumps are the least expensive to construct while boreholes and other mechanized water sources cost more. Costs per water source also vary by country and region.


For example, a deep-water well in the desert of Niger (Amman Imman) costs over \$150,000, a borehole in Northern Ghana (VVF) costs around \$9,000, a solar borehole with an earthen dam costs about \$6,200 in Zimbabwe (LID), and a hand pump water source costs around \$1,500 in Malawi (PumpAid).

Build, Repair and Maintain Water Sources

All of the investment went to projects that were directly related to building or repairing water sources, or increasing access to clean water through filtration. Frequently, the cost per project in this sector also includes training of water source management committees, training in hygiene and water treatment and community outreach.



Over **49,455** people have access to improved water sources thanks to projects funded by Vibrant Village in 2015.

The Clean Water sector has both the highest beneficiary numbers, and the lowest average cost per beneficiary at \$24.


We invested over **\$282,000** in programs designed to help our beneficiaries increase their income. At 12% of the total 2015 portfolio, this investment reached populations in Cameroon, Ghana, Kenya, Malawi, Tanzania, Zimbabwe, Haiti, Mexico, Nepal, Sri Lanka, and Papua New Guinea.

The largest proportion of Vibrant Village's investment in the Income Opportunities sector (77%) was for Agricultural Cooperatives. More than \$218,000 was invested in co-ops focused on specific products like cocoa in Papua New Guinea, and cinnamon in Sri Lanka. Other co-ops were aimed at increasing marketing and business capacity of co-op members in Cameroon, Kenya, and Zimbabwe. Vibrant Village also invested in Village Savings and Loan Associations (VSLA's), microenterprise training, and business co-ops.








2015 Total Investment by Sector: Income Opportunities

Over **2,950** people benefited from this investment.


Sanitation & Hygiene




Investments in Community Sanitation and Hygiene totaled over **\$135,000** in 2015. We supported projects in Cameroon, Ghana, Malawi, Bolivia, Sri Lanka, and Cambodia.




2015 Total Investment by Sector: Sanitation & Hygiene



In the Sanitation and Hygiene Sector, Vibrant Village has typically invested in two types of projects: Water, Sanitation and Hygiene (WASH) Education and **Community Sanitation and Hygiene** Facilities. WASH Education received 71% of the total investment at nearly \$97,000 and included projects in Cameroon, Ghana, Malawi Bolivia, and Cambodia. Almost \$39,000 was invested in projects directly funding the construction of sanitation facilities. 133 latrines were funded for construction in 2015, but many more were built using the Community Led Total Sanitation model, which depends solely on the contribution from local community members.







Sanitation & Hygiene 2015: Project Cost

Vibrant Village Foundation's investment in Sanitation and Hygiene programs reached more than **19,750** people in 2015, with an average investment of \$59 per person. These beneficiaries include those community members who received training and outreach in WASH topics as well as those with improved access to sanitation facilities. We believe that the impact of our Sanitation and Hygiene programs are even greater than reported above. All of our Clean Water projects incorporate a sanitation and hygiene component and these beneficiaries are not included here. Further, we believe the reported numbers may be undercounting


Community Enrichment

Community **Enrichment projects** received 8% of the total 2015 investment portfolio. In this sector, we invested a little over **\$196,000** in the well-being of communities in Kenya, Tanzania, Uganda, Senegal, Ecuador, and Nicaragua.




2015 Total Investment by Sector: Community Enrichment







45% of the investment in the Community Enrichment sector went to support projects focused on the community's most vulnerable citizens. In Tanzania these community members are children orphaned by AIDS and in single-parent families. In Ecuador, assistance to the elderly was the focus of the investment. Vibrant Village Foundation also invested in programs for communitybased outreach workers, arts education, and education and training for adults.



An average of \$328 was invested in each beneficiary in community enrichment projects in 2015. Vibrant Village reached over 4,100 beneficiaries with this investment.


Community Health




Investment in the Community Health sector totaled nearly **\$37,000** for 2015. This figure includes investment in projects for peer health educators, nutrition, and community health outreach in Papua New Guinea, Tanzania, Guatemala, Peru and Malawi.

All of our Community Health projects focused on outreach and education. This includes investment in reaching vulnerable populations, community health worker training, as well as programs and events.



In 2015, 9,952 people benefitted from community health-focused projects. Vibrant Village invested an average of \$53 per person in this sector.
